HOA Board Message

Budget, Budget, Budget!

As you read this, the HOA Board of Directors reviewed a first draft of the 2021 budget at the September 23rd meeting, following review by the Finance Committee. Leading up to the October 28th Town Hall and Board of Directors meeting, there will be ongoing revisions as more information is gleaned. Why is this important? Because the 2021 budget is set at the October meeting, establishing the Annual Homeowners Fee.

The challenge? Assuming the Community is still under COVID-19 gathering restrictions, providing opportunity for all property Owners to review and provide input remains difficult. The Board, with support of the Finance Committee and all Committee Chairs, will do everything possible to have the recommended budget ready within the two weeks leading up to the October 28th meeting.

The proposed budget will be available on the entry table of the Clubhouse and posted to Hi-Net. We are also considering delivering it to every residence (and sending to absent property Owners). **The Board will need your help.** At this time, the October Town Hall and Board Meeting will likely be limited in-person and Zoom online, reducing the traditional Town Hall opportunities to discuss in an open forum.

The Board could use your feedback before the Town Hall, if possible, by contacting any Board Member (general Board e-mail address is in the box to the left here). That input will be shared during the Town Hall along with others' feedback.

Be thankful for the gift of resiliency; spirits stretch instead of breaking; they offer fresh responses to life's inevitable surprises.

What are the bases of the budgets? As a reminder, there are two budgets; one is the **Operations Fund** which pays for operating costs such as utilities, staff salary, insurance, on-going landscape maintenance, janitorial, *Highlights* printing, taxes, and Comcast among other costs to keep the HOA running. Operations are funded through the Annual Homeowners Fee.

The other is the **Reserves Fund** covering the maintenance and replacement of the HOA's capital assets such as the Clubhouse, sidewalks, pathway, irrigation system, and street trees to name a few. By Oregon State rules (and HOA governing documents), the Reserves Fund cannot be used for typical operations costs. The Reserves Fund is funded primarily through the 1% transfer fee on sales of residential units (condos and single-family homes).

Please be assured, the budgets are kept to the minimum possible to maintain the HOA's operations and capital assets that keep, or increase, our property values and make King City Highlands an attractive place to call home.



Condo Updates

Condo Board Message

The Condo Owners Association (COA) Board met Thursday, September 10th at the Clubhouse.

September has been very quiet in our Community, as we all avoided going out much due to the virus and heat, and now we have been hunkered down more due to poor air quality from all the fires. For a few days, local news reported we had the worst air quality in the world! Hopefully, by the time you get this newsletter, the fires will be under control and possibly our lives will be getting back to a more 'normal' level--if there ever will be a normal again!

Due to weather conditions, work on the property has been postponed. Pro Maintenance has been overwhelmed with work orders outside our Community. They have not been able to deal with our lighter maintenance work this month. I am told the crew will start work on our smaller projects later this fall.

Our next valve box project is on hold until we get a bid from the plumber. He had to evacuate his home, so a bid has not been submitted yet. Hopefully, our Board will have one by the next Condo Board Meeting on October 8th.

My plea the last few months was to encourage more people to help on committees. In August, three people stepped up to volunteer on our Landscape Committee. We still need more help on other committees—Maintenance & Finance Committees are also looking for volunteers.

Landscape Committee Submitted by Brad Williams

The Landscape Committee met on September 8th. Various subjects were discussed by the members. As a result of those discussions, a task force was formed, with members to include Sherry Kilpatrick, Lucy Laande, Pat Barcroft and Brad Williams.

The purpose of the task force is to meet with a representative of management from our current Landscape Contractor, *Brightview*, to discuss and review current and future landscape concerns, and how improvement may be accomplished moving forward.

In addition, the task force will be meeting with three additional landscape contractors from the area that can provide landscape and irrigation needs for our property. This process has already begun. These meetings will include a walk around the property, discussions of what services each may provide, obtaining suggestions of any needed changes in our overall landscape processes, and pricing bids for comparison and consideration. The outcome of the meetings with *Brightview* and the other landscape contractors will be reported to the entire Landscape Committee, who will in turn provide their recommendations to the Board of Directors.

Sorry about the renewal of garage break-ins. I tried in vain to get a garage door company to come talk to us--one company was just shining me on. The company you can trust is Dave's Garage Doors. They have "a lock" on the hard to breach lock for the emergency override garage door. I couldn't find that lock anywhere on the internet.

Another thing Dave's technician suggested, but is fairly pricey, is to get a new garage door opener. Some of the new ones have a battery backup for when the power goes out, so you can disconnect the emergency override in the door and depend on the battery to open the door during a power outage. You can also disable the lock on the side of the garage door and only use the opener. Sounds like a win, win.

I went to a "cheap fix" for my garage. I changed the lock on the side to a harder-tobreach lock and put an electrical plate over the lock in the middle of the door. Of course, my garage is visible and not in a blind alley like with many of the break-ins. I hope this helps. Another tip is to get a security camera or alert system set up in your garage.

spective of applications from the House Owners, September was a fairly quiet month. The Architecture & Landscape Committee (ALC) received only a handful of apps and took care of all of them in short order.

While application activity was down, though, we were also dealing with a rather sudden and massive wave of wildfires in western Oregon. Thank goodness, there was no immediate threat to our Highlands Community, though many of us did experience problems from the really horrible air quality. It was like a lockdown within a lockdown this year—yet another reason to stay inside.

I would like to tip my cap here for a moment to our landscape contractor, Landscape East & West (LE&W). The wildfires were initially driven by some really fierce winds, which blew down a lot of needles, cones and small branches, particularly in the Dickson cul-desac area. That end of the street was a mess! I got in touch with LE&W for a post-storm clean-up, and they responded, as soon as personnel scheduling and air quality would allow. Within a day or so, the street was so clean you could practically eat off of the asphalt!

Our ALC meetings have had interesting discussions lately regarding the development of our budget for 2021. The ALC, working with the Finance Committee and several Board Members, are ironing out the details. The ALC is also working with our service providers (contractors) regarding schedules for all of the individual activities to be done over the coming year.

Thieves continue to be active in our Commu-



unlocked cars/trucks. Please be vigilant and report any suspicious activity to the police and your Neighborhood Watch Captains.

In one of our CPO meetings a while ago, County Sheriff gave great a Washington advice: Set a time aside each night to do a walk around your house to make sure cars/trucks are locked, garage doors are closed and your home or condo doors are locked. Believe it or not, we've left our garage door open, the door from the garage to enter our house unlocked AND our front door unlocked. That was like a triple whammy to come on in and a scary gut punch when we realized the next morning what we did! So, we do a walk around each night as a regular routine.

As an extra precaution for House Owners, if you park your car/truck outside and you have a garage door opener in there, that could be one of the items a thief might take for access to your garage. You may not even know it's missing if you don't drive that car/truck on a daily basis, like me! Some or most of you may have an extra light switch in your garage next to the aarage light switch that controls the opening of the agrage door. Switching that off at night may give you an extra peace of mind, but just remember to turn it back on. Also, some cars/trucks have the capability to program your garage opener with their internal systems. That is a great option, so

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check out those manuals!

Flashlight Reminder...


Even though Daylight Saving Time doesn't end until November 1st, it's getting

It is always important to follow simple steps to reduce exposure to toxic substances when gardening:

- Wash, soak or peel plants to avoid eating dust and soil particles.
- Don't allow kids to eat soil or dirt.
- Water plants near the bottom of the plants, to prevent soil from splashing up onto plants.
- Avoid overhead watering.
- Take off shoes and wipe down pets to avoid tracking soil or ash into your home.
- Wash your hands.



A Survival "Kit" to Stay Healthy...

A possible "twindemic"—flu season unfolding alongside the coronavirus pandemic—is worrisome. Joseph Khabbaza, MD, a pulmonary and critical care physician at Cleveland Clinic, talks about at-home essentials to help us stay healthy this fall and beyond. Suggestions:

- Thermometer—This medicine cabinet essential should be easy to use and read.
- **Meditation**—Stress reduction is crucial in all aspects of life. Choose one that has meditations and exercises for sleep, focus, stress, and anxiety.
- Hand Sanitizer—An important product when you're out of the house this fall. Choose one that can be massaged into the skin to hydrate and zap bacteria or spritzed on masks and left to air-dry when there's no time to wash.
- The Right Mask—When you combine masks with distancing, it's hard to get COVID-19, and it's kind of empowering to remind ourselves that we're in a bit more control than we thought.
- Flu Shot—Because influenza is largely preventable, the sooner you have that extra layer of protection, the better. It will also help prevent over-whelming hospitals with flu patients.
- **Pulse Oximeter**—If you're considered high risk, a pulse oximeter is a good idea. It measures oxygen levels and pulse rate.
- Fluids—Old-fashioned H2O and electrolytecontaining drinks can help keep you out of the hospital when you're sick—64 ounces/ day is recommended to replenish lost fluids and stay hydrated.


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
