
Condo Board Message

December is here and what a year this has been! And I don't think any of us will ever forget it! Merry Christmas and hurray for a New Year!

At the November 12th COA Board Meeting:

- ◆ The Board received and approved the recommendation from the Landscape Committee to switch our vendor to Landscape East & West. We will terminate our contract with BrightView as of February 1, 2021, having given them 90-day notice.
- ♦ A decision was made to change our meeting day to the 4th Thursday of each month beginning January 2021. This allows us to gather more information, bids, and support material prior to our meetings.



It has been reported by Condo Owners, *BrightView*, and *Pro Maintenance* that we are having problems with pets. Feces has been found throughout the property and many areas of lawn have been identified as burn spots from urination. There are areas behind two garage buildings on the west side of the property that are covered with bark dust where your pets can relieve themselves with no harm to our common areas. Please remember to leash your pet, pick up their messes and whenever possible, walk them to these locations.

Feces left on the lawns gets into the blades of the mowers. The mower then spreads the feces across a wider area and requires cleaning of the mowers in order to remove the mess! Along with owners stepping into it. Remember, having a pet is your responsibility and that includes cleaning up after them. Please be considerate of your neighbors and the property.

It's been noted in the *Highlights* that volunteering is essential to the operation of our Community! This is even more important as we vote for new COA Board Members in February 2021. Wayne Staley and I will be retiring from the Board, so these positions need to be filled. Please consider stepping up for a Board position. Having a volunteer Board avoids having to hire someone to do the Board's important business--which then would affect our budget, and potentially, our monthly dues.

Again, I want to encourage those of you who are able to volunteer. We can't accomplish as much as we would like without your help. Share your time and energy!

the garage doors. They should be simple, the same approximate size (@18-20 inches in diameter, depending on how you measure the outer branches!), and green with red bow attached, so it matches all other wreaths. Be sure to have one with a center hole big enough to go over the light fixture so it hangs from the connecting arm to the garage.

New Residents, your seller may or may not have left you one. For any folks who don't have wreaths, you may work it out among your building neighbors to share the cost, or purchase one yourself. You can get inexpensive, good deals on wreaths and bows at stores such as Michaels.

This year it's been difficult to focus much attention on anything, but this tradition of sharing the Holiday spirit is heart-warming. Seeing the wreaths on the garage building lights between garage doors throughout the whole Community Is an awesome sight and very uplifting!

sure came to a sudden halt this year, didn't it? We had months of warm (but not too hot), sunny and dry days, right up until early November. Then the temperatures cooled and the rain came, the leaves quickly turned, and then just as quickly fell, and it gets dark out by 4:30 in the afternoon. Personally, I still haven't recovered from the switch back to standard time...

Needless to say, with all of the rain we got in November, we were able to get the HOA's irrigation systems shut down, drained, and blown out – on November 4th. The separate water account that the HOA has along 131st Avenue was also turned off by the Tigard Water Department on that same date (saving us the monthly base charge on that meter). Our water costs should come in a bit under the projected/budgeted expense for 2020; exactly how much will have to wait for the December billing cycle. It's always nice to be able to save a few bucks from being spent from the Operations Fund!

A few final projects are underway here at the end of 2020. The replanting of the bed next to the bench in the Central Greenway was completed in early November; check out the new view! The Dickson Triangle project (Phase I) *might* finally be done by the time you see this. Some new/replacement shrubs are still to be planted along the Beef Bend brick wall, too. All of these projects had been approved by the Board earlier in the year – but we're about out of time for anything else.



Folks, I hate to rain on your parade, but the pandemic has only been getting worse. Wear that mask—they have found that it protects you and

others. We live in Washington County and the reports are showing that COVID-19 infection rates are high.

COVID-19 is spread in enclosed spaces with poor ventilation. You don't have to cough or sneeze to spread it. All you have to do is breath—a fine mist lingers in the air. Houses make it a little easier, but Think ENTRYWAY into our Condos—so, wear a mask in ANY enclosed space, please. Every time you open your door into an entryway, you let any virus that may be floating around in the air into your home. Or, if you unknowingly have COVID-19, you let the air of your home into an entryway (or any entry/ enclosed space).

The package of 10 three-layer blue disposable masks sold at Safeway are supposed to be good protection from COVID-19, or the regular flu, or a common cold. I hang one on my doorknob into the entryway to remind myself to put it on before I go out. If I only wear that mask a few minutes in a day, I let it air dry to use another day.

If you live in a downstairs unit you might consider using your patio door to go out to check your mail or empty your trash. That way you won't have to mask up at all. But always carry a mask with you.

Wear a mask, stay six feet apart, wash your hands frequently. Stay safe, stay healthy, stay alive.

S A giant-sized Santa and Mrs. Claus dipped their toes in the water fountain in front of City Hall, and Hawaii Christmas music was always playing.



Christmas Eve was spent at church with services that included the entire congregation and the Tongan congregation, with the Tongan choir singing beautiful Christmas hymns acapella. Fellowship was full of joy, spirit, including Christmas desserts from various cultures! Locals and visitors alike waited with anticipation to greet Santa as he came in from the ocean on his special outrigger canoe.



On Christmas day after opening presents, we always went to the beach and hung out until dinner-time. Seriously, how many people get to spend the special day basking in the sun and playing in the

water? Dinner always consisted of steak and all the trimmings as it was too hot for a traditional dinner, and a movie or game night with friends always followed in the late afternoon or evening.

Our memories of this special Holiday time will always hold a special place in our hearts!


