COA Annual Meeting and Board Elections

The Annual Meeting of The Unit Owners of Highland Park Condominiums is scheduled for Thursday, February 25, 2021 at 5:30 p.m. Community Management (CMI) will be mailing information about the Meeting itself, plus proxies, to all Owners of Record approximately 40 days in advance of the Meeting. This year, more than any other, it is especially important that you return your signed and filled out proxy to CMI as soon as possible. Please do not place your proxies in the mail slot at the Clubhouse Office. This year, we will not ask Mabel to handle the proxies. Because of COVID-19 restrictions, only a limited number of Condo Owners (19) will be allowed to attend the Meeting in person. Our Bylaws require that a total of 63 units be represented either in person or by signed proxy in order to conduct the Annual Meeting. Please mail your proxies early; if a quorum is not achieved, the meeting will have to be rescheduled to a later date.

The most important purpose of the Annual Meeting is to elect new members to our five-member Board of Directors. This year there are three openings since the two-year terms of Sherry Kilpatrick, Ron Laande, and Wayne Staley will expire as of February 25th. As of this writing, there are no declared candidates for the open positions. We cannot operate as a viable Community without a Board of Directors, so please consider running for one of these important positions.

Condo Landscape Committee

Actually, there Submitted by Pat Barcroft was more activity than one would expect for January.

As mentioned before, much of our landscape has become overgrown and some trees are infringing on the buildings. We are in the process of coming up with the plan, which will include what trees are coming down and what will replace them. Our new landscape contractor, Landscape East & West, has been on the job walking the property and taking into consideration what the Committee has shared as our concerns. We are very grateful that even though they don't start until February 1st, they have taken their own time to become familiar with our property.

Major Projects 2021 and Beyond

Deck Repairs: There are nine more to go and then we will be done with decks, at least for the immediate future. Our consultant needs to solicit bids and a contractor will be selected by the Board of Directors.

Water Shutoff Valve Replacement: This project, which stalled out again in 2020, needs to be started up again and most of the work needs to be completed in 2021.

Main Entry Door Handle Replacement: This has been kicking around since early 2019. It's time to make a decision or just not go ahead with this project.

Front Entry Carpet Replacement: This project will be budgeted to begin in 2022 and continue in 2023. This year a small ad hoc committee should be formed to do all the advance work such as contacting vendors, selecting carpet or other materials and obtaining bids from three vendors. There should also be a plan to repair plaster damage and paint the entries plus possibly replace the very outdated lighting fixtures. This work would need to be done before installation of new carpet. All this research would need to be completed by Sept. 2021 so the costs can be included in the 2022/2023 Replacement Reserve budget.

Streetlights Replacement: Our streetlight fixtures are going to need replacement, possibly as soon as 2022, but more likely 2023. This is another project that will require advance planning. Much more info to come on this subject in coming months.

Last month, I encouraged each of us to spend time in the Word as we process through these difficult times. Our faith is an important part of how we live life on a daily basis. It's

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
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
