
Remember When?

Being A Good Neighbor

Folks, you should have known when you chose to live in a condo

community, that we all share resources—entryways, trash and recycling bins, parking areas, and green spaces. Saying that, we need to be considerate of each other. We need to think <u>before</u> we discard that trash or those recycling items.

Things to think about: What IS trash? What IS recycling? Those bins are <u>not</u> interchangeable. The LARGE black-lid bins are for trash; the blue-lid bins are for recycling. Please look before you dump.

<u>Pet waste</u>: <u>DO NOT</u> put any loose pet waste in trash containers!

- Cat litter needs to be in a sealed strong small plastic trash bag or be double bagged in small plastic bags.
- ◆ Dog waste needs to be in a sealed plastic bag. <u>Cigarette waste</u> needs to be bagged and sealed, and please make sure those butts are fully out. <u>Recycled glass containers</u>: need to be clean; they go in the SMALL black-lid bin, for glass ONLY.

Recycled cardboard boxes:

- ◆ Break down/flatten <u>ALL</u> size boxes—not just shipping boxes, but also dry food boxes, multi-pack boxes, and Kleenex boxes, etc. Remember, recycling is picked up <u>every two weeks</u> and is for all Residents' items; there is only so much room in those bins. Boxes not broken down take up too much "air space"!
- Flattened larger cardboard boxes (up to 3 feet max) may be placed vertically between the blue bins. To avoid soggy large cardboard boxes sitting out if it's been raining, wait until the Sunday evening before, or early AM on pick-up date, to put them out.

Recycling pick-up days this month are the 10th and 24th.

You are encouraged to go to <u>washingtoncountyre-cycles.com</u> and <u>pridedisposal.com/resources/recycling-guide</u> for more detailed information on acceptable trash and recycling.

Clubhouse Maintenance



As reported last month, the drain-

age project at the Clubhouse Northwest corner is complete. We now

need to get the reseeded lawn areas to germinate and grow, which will take some extra sprinkling—we're looking to the ALC to provide that. We've also asked the Condo Association to repair that part of their drainage system—which is uphill from the Clubhouse—so it will catch storm runoff that would otherwise come downhill both above and below the surface.

The color of the new concrete walkway continues to be an issue. It is fading in places and becoming mottled. What is supposed to happen is, the dark color will power wash off when the concrete is adequately cured. The company which makes the dye which was used has photos on its website which say that the color that we wanted requires the dye that we used. If it doesn't work, we will have to go to a 'Plan B'.

The air conditioning system has started operating, especially in the Great Room with all of its south side windows. All six compressors and related fans will get tuned late this month. Our exercise groups don't like it hot!

Have You Heard of Mill Ends Park?



Mill Ends Park is a tiny urban park located in the median strip of SW Naito Parkway, approaching esplanade along the Willamette River near SW Taylor Street in downtown Port-

land. This park looks more like a small ordinary circle of plants. But at just 24 inches (61 centimeters) in diameter, it's designated by the Guinness Book of World Records as the Smallest Park in the World!

Its story began when a journalist for the Oregon Journal, Dick Fagan, got tired of looking at an empty hole (for a light pole that never came) below his office window. He decided to plant flowers in the hole and name it Mill Ends Park. To generate interest in this tiny green space, Fagan then centered many newspaper stories about the capers of a fictitious park resident—a leprechaun named Patrick O'Toole. The park was dedicated on St. Patrick's Day in 1948; it became an official City Park in 1976.

Over the years, events have been held at the park and contributions have been made to the park, such as the small swimming pool and diving board for butterflies, many statues, a miniature Ferris Wheel (which was brought in by a normal-

sized crane), and the occasional flying saucer.


that took was one swat across the nose!).

In These Times—When Fully Vaccinated...

...10 Things You Need to Know

The coronavirus is still spreading and the majority of Americans are not yet vaccinated—precautions are still necessary to protect yourself <u>and</u> the people around you. The CDC has published some specific guidance about what we should and should not do, and experts answered AARP questions about life after vaccination.

- You still need to wear a mask—Besides circulating, new/ more contagious variants have emerged. Masks and social distancing are important to help slow the spread until we reach herd immunity—estimating vaccination of 70-85 percent of the population.
- 2. You could still catch COVID-19—The 3 U.S. authorized vaccines were highly effective against severe disease and death from COVID-19, but you could still get infected. "...it prevents you from dying or ending up in the hospital," says Purvi Parikh, M.D., an allergist/immunologist at NYU Langone Health/COVID-19 vaccine clinical trials investigator.
- 3. You could infect someone else—There's a chance of you getting infected and not even realize it; you could then transmit it to someone who is not vaccinated, says Kristen Marks, M.D., infectious disease specialist. New York-Presbyterian/Weill Cornell Medicine and a COVID-19 vaccine trials leader.
- 4. You can visit family & friends—on a limited basis and under certain conditions. See the AARP article (link below) for details. The CDC still recommends avoiding medium-size and large gatherings.
- You don't have to quarantine after exposure—Or get tested, as long as you aren't experiencing any symptoms, the CDC says. If you develop COVID-19 symptoms, however, you should get tested.
- You should keep your vaccine record card handy—In the future, you may need proof of vaccination to travel, work in certain industries or attend large events. Other validation systems are being considered.
- Regarding travel—It is being permitted within the U.S., but the CDC still discourages unnecessary travel. Every time there's a surge in travel, we have a surge in cases in this country. Look for updates.

- 8. It's a good time to see the doctor or dentist— Countless Americans put their health care on hold due to the pandemic. Schedule those routine screenings, and appointments—even surgery you've put off.
- You may need a booster shot— Data is still being collected on how long immunity from the vaccines will last. Chances are, we will need some kind of COVID-19 shot on a regular basis, perhaps every 3 years, or every year—like the flu shot.
- 10. Return to normal hinges on herd immunity—I Estimates range from summer 2021-early 2022.I Timeline factors include the percentage of Americans willing to get the vaccine, how quickly a vaccine for children is authorized, and how well the vaccines work against more contagious variants.




