#### Being Mindful...

By the time you read this, Oregon State's and Washington County's COVID guidelines will likely have changed once again. As we learned on May 11 (which now seems like the distant past), fully vaccinated people are no longer required to wear masks in certain situations. However, at the time of this writing, "certain situations" are only those vaguely defined with the promise that more details are forthcoming. And even at this moment, if you are fully vaccinated you are still required to abide by social distancing (6 feet) and social gathering capacity (indoors in the Clubhouse the recommendation is no more than 10 persons from 4 households ).

Where does that leave the Community's return to "normal" access to the Clubhouse, club activities, and social gatherings? At this time, unclear. Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has suggested that greater freedom may become available with some kind of vaccination verification. Do we have, or want, that kind of responsibility? Probably not,

The application is e-mailed to the ALC members with the coordinator recommendation to "approve" or "needs discussion." If a majority of the ALC approve, the Resident will get a call or e-mail within a week granting "instant approval". An application needing further discussion will be addressed the following Wednesday in a meeting of the ALC and one of three actions will be taken: approval, approval with conditions needing to be met, or denial. The majority of applications are readily approved because Homeowners are reading the A&L Manual and adhering to guidelines. Thank you!

#### Clubhouse Maintenance

May was warmer than usual, putting the Clubhouse air conditioning system to work. There are six furnaces in the attic each connected to an outside

air conditioning compressor. The furnaces burn natural gas to heat and the compressors supply coolant to them when air conditioning is called for by the thermostats. The furnace fans move the warm or cool air to the various rooms. The fans are big and some days you can hear them run. Why six? The Clubhouse has rooms of widely varying size, the Library has a thermostat, a furnace and an air conditioner just for that space, as do the Great Room, the Ball Room, the Card Room, the two rooms on the West side, and one set to serve the Kitchen and Rest Rooms. Comparing the combined cubic area of the Kitchen and Rest Rooms with that of the Great Room makes it apparent that the need for heat or AC varies considerably depending on the space. Not surprising, the biggest equipment serves the Great Room. That room needs air conditioning some days in February because of all the East and South side windows letting in the sun.

The Energy Trust and PGE say that we use much less power than other buildings of similar size.

Because of considerations of safety and efficiency, we are replacing one furnace and an AC compressor each year. They have been well taken care of, but they were installed in the early 1990's and they are showing their age.

The AC system has been tested and tuned up recently to keep our exercise groups and all others in the Clubhouse happy.

Back in the day when recycling became an important thing to do for the environment, plastic was the number one target. Somebody decided almost all plastic items would be recyclable and busi-

nesses popped up everywhere to cash in on this new industry. Citizens in states like Oregon eagerly participated. Unfortunately, with a few exceptions this was a losing proposition. Today there are some plastic items that can still be recycled and not end up in landfills, but most plastic is not recyclable and ends up in Oregon landfills, oceans around the world, and in huge open garbage dumps in SE Asian countries such as Cambodia.

Here is a list of items we wish we could still toss in the recycle bins but should not: Clamshell containers used for everything from baked goods to fresh vegetables to deli sandwiches, all plastic bags and bubble wrap, plastic plates, cups and utensils, coffee pods, straws, frozen food trays and Styrofoam.

The list goes on and on. Unfortunately, all these items need to go in the trash bins and ultimately, they will end up somewhere out in the environment. The answer of course is to use less plastic whenever possible. Plastic products are convenient and awfully hard to avoid. Just remember that only a very few are acceptable in the recycle bins. #### The Fate of Used Batteries

I recently Submitted by Mabel Weber received information regarding the dangers of storing used batteries.

In checking with the HOA President, I was told we <u>MUST NOT COLLECT USED BATTERIES IN THE</u> <u>CLUBHOUSE ANY LONGER.</u>

Residents are welcome to collect their own batteries and take them to *Batteries and Bulbs* at 7715 SW Nyberg St, Suite A. Phone number (503) 783-3252. They are located across from the Tualatin Fred Meyer and in the same area as New Seasons and Home Goods.

I understand they charge \$1.25 per pound to recycle them. Thank you very much.

#### Tips to help prevent a Catalytic Converter from being stolen:

- The No. 1 way to protect your vehicle's Catalytic Converter is to park your vehicle(s) inside a garage or in a secure side yard or place.
- 2. If you must park your vehicle in the driveway or parking lot, motion detector lights or continuous lights illuminating the parking area *may* be a deterrent.
- 3. Getting a vehicle motion detector alarm also may help.
- 4. Educate your friends and neighbors about Catalytic Converter theft so they can be a look-out, too.
- 5. Have extra metal welded to your exhaust system. Muffler shops are offering creative ways to protect your Catalytic Converter. They weld on metal to make it difficult for the Catalytic Converter to be removed. The cost is often less than your insurance deductible and definitely less than the full replacement cost (if you don't have comprehensive insurance). Source: Newark, CA Police Dept.

6. Install a Catalytic Converter Protection Device. There are devices on the market that will clamp/go around your Catalytic Converter. Devices are often more expensive than welding extra metal, but for some, this is the preferred option.

#### What if your Catalytic Converter is stolen?

If your Catalytic Converter is stolen, you will know right away when you start your vehicle. It will sound like you don't have a muffler at all (like loud motorcycle mufflers). It is OK to drive your vehicle directly to a muffler/dealer shop to get the Catalytic Converter replaced. You do not need your vehicle towed to the shop.

Rob and Mary brought me home

from CAT (Cat Adoption Team) in Sherwood. Before that, I was in Texas and Utah, looking for a forever home. I was scared but when I met them, I knew they'd take good care of me.

My days are pretty routine—up at 4 a.m. to grab a bite and use the litter box-back to bedup again when Rob and Mary get up-then back to bed. After lunch, I take Mary (sometimes Rob) for a walk in the neighborhood. I wear a halter and leash to keep me safe but still get into a lot of sniffs, rolling around, and even climb a tree or two when I'm out. Then it's back for a treat, litter box visit, and a nice nap. I usually sleep until dinner, and after dinner, I go between Rob's and Mary's laps to get pets and scratches (I usually end up on Rob's lap). At bedtime, I wait for Rob and Mary, and then settle down for the night. Sometimes I even sleep with them, but usually I go to my own bed. At times, I turn into 'crazy cat', racing around the house, jumping onto furniture, across the bed, anywhere I can be crazy. I haven't broken anything-yet.

So that's my story. I'm really glad to be here and have met some people and a few dogs (as long as they don't bark, I don't mind them too much) when I go for my walks. Make sure if you see me, stop to say "hi." I'm a cat so I may or may not come over to you—no offense.

The reason I'm sharing this information with you today, is hoping I can save just one person from having to go to the emergency room.

I was playing a game of solitaire on my computer (although I should have been cleaning the kitchen), when suddenly I headed to the bathroom with terrible stomach cramps. Now I was sweating and thought I was going to faint. I quickly put a towel down on my bathroom floor for my head and I laid there weakly calling for my son. Thank goodness he was in the house that day. When he didn't get any response from me, he called 9-1-1. (He is 44 years old and admitted to me later that he had never called 9-1-1 in his life!) The paramedics came and checked vitals and after they ruled out a heart problem, drove me away to Providence Newberg. The paramedics had already started an IV and when I arrived at the hospital, they began my first bag of IV fluids as I was dehydrated. After two bags of fluid my body came around and I was able to be discharged five hours after arriving.

I want to let you know that this is so preventable, but we don't always think about the amount of water that we need. In all the articles I have read, it is recommended that we drink eight 8-ounce glasses of water per day.

I am now drinking my water as I did my coffee. First thing in the morning I am drinking an entire water bottle (23.7 FL OZ) before I do anything else. The other two bottles I drink during the course of the day and evening. Don't leave home without your water!

#### **Understanding COVID-19 Variants**

A COVID-19 variant is a form of the virus which has mutated (changed part of its genetic code) over time. Viruses change constantly, and new variants of a virus are expected to appear. Some new variants emerge and then disappear, and others remain in circulation.

There are two levels of classification for variants of ISARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19.

- The first classification is Variants of Interest: These are variants with specific mutations that are predicted to affect how the virus spreads, can be detected or can be treated.
- The second classification is Variants of Concern: These are variants with evidence for increased transmission or disease severity or evidence of an effect on testing, treatment or vaccine effectiveness.

SARS-CoV-2 variants are being tracked by public health officials at the state and federal levels to learn about their effects and how to limit their transmission. In Oregon, the Oregon State Public Health Laboratory, academic partners (Oregon State University, the University of Oregon, Oregon Health & Science University) and other laboratories (Providence, Kashi) are sequencing COVID-19 specimens to identify the variants.

While there is still more to learn about COVID-19 variants, we do know that the best protection against COVID-19 variants is wearing a mask, limiting gatherings and getting vaccinated.

And the good news keeps coming on the authorized COVID-19 vaccines. The current data suggests the authorized COVID-19 vaccines in the U.S. offer protection against severe illness and death caused by all variants of COVID-19.
