HOA Board Message

What A Difference A Day (Year) Makes...

During this time, a year ago, we were in a period of fear and uncertainty. Strains of those remain but because of all the precautions the Community has taken, it appears we're reaching the other side of the pandemic. At the time of this writing, the State had not yet met it's 70% vaccination goal, but hopefully by the time you read this, there will be additional lifting of restrictions. On behalf of the HOA Board, THANK YOU ALL for the part you've played following the Clubhouse and common areas health guidelines.

Due to the uncertainty of what lay ahead, the 2021 Annual Budget was approved with a very modest revenue target (derived primarily from living unit transfer fees). During the approval process at the Annual Meeting, the HOA Board agreed to conduct a mid-year budget review. The Finance Committee reviewed income and expenses in June. Based on the number of living units sold to date, and the increased sales price, it appears the income projection should be reached or exceeded by the end of the year.

This is great news for the year! Most of the intended repair, replace, and maintenance projects will be accomplished keeping our Community an attractive place to live. And there remain contingency funds to address unforeseen events such as the drainpipes around the Clubhouse.

Be assured that all Committees with spending authority will continue to be prudent with expenditures and that the Board will continue its oversight of the Community's financial health.

Interested in the working of your HOA Board? Call any Board member for a coffee or tea. Learn what it means to be on the HOA Board. It's not too early to start thinking about stepping up—two Board positions will be up for election this November, three in 2022. This community runs on volunteer energy and new perspectives. You've heard it before;

What a Submitted by Pat Barcroft year this has been from a landscape perspective! As we all know, it has been extraordinary in terms of weather. Not

only has our new vendor been at a disadvantage in the sense of getting familiar with our grounds, but the ice storm caused severe problems at many of their accounts, so they were playing catch up for several weeks.

As a result of the weather, the weeds popped up in abundance. June is the month for weed spraying and the weeds will be taken care of. As you may have noticed there was one week when the lawns were not mowed. This was done to allow the grass to grow. We definitely have had a problem with getting the right amount of water at various locations. This has been remedied.

In the last newsletter, I misspoke and suggested we were looking into replacing our irrigation system. Zoe Allen, who is Chair of the Finance Committee, almost had cardiac arrest and reminded me that what I meant to convey is the changing of our controllers, which are old and very out of date.

The new vendor is doing an excellent job with the trees and shrubs. It will take some time to allow some of the trees and shrubs to be allowed to grow to reflect their natural shape. If you have an interest in the landscaping of our property, please attend our Landscape Committee Meeting, held on the second Tuesday of the month. The meeting starts at 12 p.m. for the Committee to talk about the issues, and at 1 p.m. we meet with our vendor to talk about issues that pertain to them.

HOA Updates



Clubhouse Maintenance

We are completing a Reserve Study Review which estimates the cost and timing of the maintenance, repair, and replacement of all the items of our

common property for 30 years—a good time to review the Clubhouse maintenance projects which have been completed in the past five years.

- We replaced 23 Southside windows—15 in 2017, 5 in 2018, and 3 in 2020.
- The plywood siding on the South and East walls of the Great Room was replaced.
- The storage shed, the pad it sits on, and the walkway across the South side were installed to store tables, BBQs and other objects too heavy to carry to the attic.
- Rotted siding near the ground on the East and South walls was replaced.
- The Parking Lot lights and timer were upgraded for more reliable service.
- We dug up and rebuilt the drainage system on all sides of the building.
- The locking mechanisms on the three single Clubhouse doors were upgraded and a strong security film was applied to the glass.
- ♦ The weather stripping on all double doors, including the entry doors was completely replaced.
- The heavy folding tables were replaced with light-weight white plastic tables—12 eight-foot, 10- six foot, and 10 round tables. 25 older chairs were replaced, and another 25 added.
- The fire alarm system was rebuilt with the addition of an automated cell phone device to call the fire department without human intervention.
- The Great Room piano was put on wheels!
- One furnace was replaced in 2018, another in 2019. In 2020, a furnace and an air conditioning compressor were replaced. In 2021, we will replace another furnace and compressor, leaving one furnace and four compressors for replacement in future years.
- The electrical system serving the kitchen and Ball Room was given additional capacity and improved safety.
- The lights and fans in the restrooms are now controlled by motion detectors, eliminating the risk that the fans would be left running for extended times. The hood fans in the kitchen are also now on timers.

Happy Summer! The spring flush of blooms is past, and we are now into the various textures and greens of

summer. Bright annuals add such great color. Walkers and those driving by all appreciate the joy such vibrancy brings.

Three members of the ALC, Judy Baese, Elaine Sobel and Connie Holt creatively revised the Approved Paint Color Notebook. Upon approval by the Board of Directors, the new edition will be at the Clubhouse awaiting residents' viewing. New colors have been added for exterior and trim with a variety of vibrant front door choices. The goal was to update the palette while maintaining a Northwest vibe.

Irrigation remains a constant topic at our meetings. The HOA Board of Directors approved a proposal by Landscape East & West to install a new underground drip system in the Fir Grove. We hope to add replacement rhododendrons and NW natives to that space next fall. The maintenance crew is allowing 'duff' (decomposing leaves, needles, branches) to accumulate on this forest floor. Over time, this will improve the health of the soil. A recent hole dug behind the Dickson and Overgaard cul-desacs produced nothing but dry dust and crumbled clay. While planting the donated rhododendron, we added compost. Neighboring Homeowners are providing additional water to insure a satisfactory transplanting.

If you have finished your ALC approved project, please remember to contact one of the coordinators or me, so we can properly record, file, and stamp COMPLETE on your application.

We meet in person at 9:30 a.m. on the first Wednesday of the month in the Clubhouse. We invite you to join us on that day, or as a member of our Committee. As always, please contact me at alc-chair@kchighlandshoa.com with any questions or concerns.

Maintenance History

- The white belt around the exterior of the Clubhouse was inspected for water damage and the old plywood was replaced by HardiPlank.
- ◆ All gutters and down spouts were replaced with greatly increased capacity.
- The exterior of the entire building was painted.
- The rest room toilets were fixed to divert some water to the floor drain system, keeping water in the traps and preventing sewer gas from being drawn into the rooms by the fans.
- The wallpaper in both restrooms was removed!
- The parking lot was given a new topcoat, proper disabled parking spots, and curb and line painting.
- ♦ In 2020, all 21 fluorescent ceiling light fixtures were replaced with LED fixtures.
- Sanitizing spray and wipes were placed in seven Clubhouse areas, allowing it to remain open during the pandemic.
- A serious water drainage problem was discovered early in 2021 at the Northwest corner of the Clubhouse. It required a quick and costly fix.

Wish-Cycling 3—

Styrofoam

Lots of people think *Styrofoam* is just garbage, but it's not! It is true that Styrofoam--also known as #PS6 Poly Styrene—cannot be placed in regular recycle bins for

pick up by *Pride Disposal*. Styrofoam is a plastic that is nearly indestructible. Most of it ends up in landfills, oceans, beaches, and streams all over the world where it can take hundreds of thousands of years to decompose. In other words, it does not decompose in most cases.

The good news is that right here in Tigard there is a company that has found a way to recycle most Styrofoam, including the small trays used as packaging for fresh meats, poultry, and vegetables. Agilyx Corp. developed a patented method to extract resalable oil product from single-use Styrofoam. There are customers for this product. Recyclable Styrofoam can be dropped off at any time, 24/7, at the Agilyx plant located at 13240 SW Wall St., Tigard 97223. The challenge at a property such as KC Highlands is to have volunteers willing to help collect or store the product until there is enough to make the short drive worthwhile. A small (right now) group of owners is going to explore a way to get a regular Styrofoam recycle program going for both the houses and the condos. Our first step will be asking for the support of the two Boards of Directors. Stay tuned for more info.

Now, a word about *glass recycling*. We are supplied an extra container by *Pride Disposal* for glass bottles and jars. *They DO NOT accept broken glass of any kind*. Broken glass must be securely bagged or wrapped and placed in the garbage. All lids or corks must be removed, and the bottles or jars must be rinsed out. Glass dishes, other containers, and mirrors are not accepted for recycling. *Pride* empties the totes every 2 weeks or so.

If you accumulate corks from wine bottles, New Seasons markets accepts true corks (no plastic) at the entrance to their locations.






are intoxicating, and they let me wander around at my leisure.

If you're fully vaccinated, you may be able to enter some indoor places without wearing a mask, but only if you show them your vaccination card. Here are some tips about your vaccination card:

- ♦ Keep your vaccination card in a safe place.
- ◆ Take a picture of your vaccination card as a backup copy.

- ♦ Don't share your card on social media unless you cover your personal information.





Activities resuming must schedule Clubhouse time and space with the HOA Office for the Clubhouse/Newsletter calendar.
