The annual HOA Reserve Study is an important component of our budget process. Like the aging of our homes, our community-owned assets need maintenance and eventually, replacement. These are potentially expensive, so Reserve Funds are accrued to pay for these future needs.

The Reserve Study projects a disparity between expenses and accruals over the next 10-20 years. As a Community, we will begin to discuss ways to close that gap gradually rather than be faced with significant annual assessments. Discussions will occur over Hi-Net and at Town Halls. Please join in these discussions—this is your Community, these are your dollars, and you are part Owner in the common assets such as the Clubhouse, sidewalks, brick walls, and landscaping.

"And it was still hot." The final line in Maurice Sendak's book, "Where the Wild Things Are," has

been my litany day after day this summer. Our last measurable rain was June 16th and according to NOAA, July was the hottest on record. We've also received only about half the rain we usually get up to this point in KC Highlands "irrigation season," which runs from the beginning of April through the end of September. Please remember to keep your street trees watered and keep your "puddle stones" and bird baths filled with fresh water for the birds and bees.

As was posted on Hi-Net in mid-August, the ALC has revised the Architectural and Landscape Manual. We, as a committee, cannot stress enough the importance of referring to this document before you begin your exterior landscape or building project. The guidelines in the manual provide for the continuation of KC Highlands as a premier community in which House Owners and Condo Owners take pride. We all remember those first drives past the clock tower and Clubhouse, down Peachvale, up the culde-sacs and down to the Fir Grove. This was the place you wanted to live. The manual provides the framework that creates this appeal.

Street tree roots can cause sidewalks to rise and become tripping hazards. The HOA accepts responsibility to repair this and recently had Safe Sidewalks smooth a panel to ADA standards. The work at 12840 SW Peachvale was performed quickly and at a reasonable cost. Uneven sidewalks NOT caused by street tree roots are the House Owners' responsibility. For repairs of a tripping hazard in front of your house, consult the vendor list at the Clubhouse.

The ALC meets at the Clubhouse the first Wednesday of the month at 9:30 a.m. We accomplish a great deal through lively discussion and decision-making. Do join us as either a guest or a potential member. As always, contact me at <u>alc-chair@kchighlandshoa.com</u> with concerns or comments.

# Storing Your Food...

In the Fridge— Most fruits, veggies, herbs and all cut produce can be stored in the fridge.

**Store separately**— Fruits and veggies. Gases from ripening fruit, especially apples, pears, and bananas, can make other produce ripen and spoil faster.

*In the Cupboard/Pantry*— Store onions, garlic, winter squash, potatoes, mangos, papayas and pineapples in a cool dark place, like a cupboard.

**Special Note**— Store potatoes separately from onions. Gases from the onions will make potatoes sprout faster.

# What to Know About the Delta Variant

You've probably heard by now about the Delta Variant, a highly contagious strain of COVID-19. In just a few months, it has quickly become the dominant variant in the United States — and it's causing a national rise in new infections and hospitalizations.

Here are six things you need to know about the Delta Variant and staying protected.

- Unvaccinated people are at higher risk of getting COVID-19 now than they were before Delta appeared.
- More young people are getting sick with Delta compared with earlier variants.
- Delta Variant symptoms are the same as other versions of COVID-19. However, Delta may be causing people to get sicker faster, including younger people.
- The COVID-19 vaccine is the best way to protect yourself and others against Delta. Even in the rare case that you do get infected, the vaccine will likely prevent you from becoming seriously ill.
- A small number of fully vaccinated people have become infected with the Delta variant. Their symptoms tend to be mild, but it's still possible to spread the virus to others.

Everyone should continue wearing masks in crowded settings and public indoor spaces—including fully vaccinated people, especially in areas of high transmission. Masks are still required in medical facilities, and federal, state, and local regulations still apply, including business and workplace guidance. Washing your hands, staying physically distanced, and avoiding large gatherings will also help lower your risk of catching or spreading the Delta variant.
